CLASS 4 - JUNIOR RABBIT SHOWMANSHIP

Ages 10 and under

CLASS 5 - FIRST-YEAR RABBIT SHOWMANSHIP

Ages 10, 11, and 12 with no Junior Fair Rabbit Show experience

Not eligible for Classes 1, 2, 3 and 4.

CLASS 6 - FIRST YEAR RABBIT SHOWMANSHIP

Ages 8 and 9 with no Junior Fair Rabbit Show experience

Not eligible for Classes 1, 2, 3 and 4.

CLASS 7 - SUPREME SHOWMANSHIP

Winners of Classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 this year and previous winners of Senior or Supreme Showmanships.

Any Showman awarded first place in Supreme Showmanship after 1996 may only show in the Supreme Showmanship class thereafter.

Showman is required to be a 4-H or FFA parent, advisor, sponsor or involved in Coshocton County 4-H or FFA activities during the past year. Judging will be strictly on the showmanship of the individual and not on the animal. It is NOT required the showman own the animal which they exhibit in this class. The class may be divided if necessary.

DEPARTMENT K**DOGS**

1. This department is open to exhibitors enrolled in 4-H Canine Pet Care, Pilot Puppy or Obedience Training or a program through one of the Junior Fair organizations.

2. Dogs in heat will not be exhibited.

3. Dogs will only remain at the fair during the actual show and will be confined with their owner while on the fairgrounds.

4. All exhibitors shall have available for examination at the beginning of the show, a current dog license and certificates of current parvo, rabies and distemper, Adenovirus (CAV-1 & CAV-2), Leptospirosis and Parainfluenza (CPI) vaccinations administered by a veterinarian. All dog exhibitors must have either an ODA official health certificate or the certificate of vaccination for the 4-H Dog Show Project available for examination at the beginning of the Dog Show.

5. Each exhibitor shall provide his own leash, water dish, cage and other equipment needed.

6. Exhibitors must enter level A if the handler or dog were NOT previously in this class or have shown in this class in other shows. (AKC or UKC sanctioned shows or sanctioned show matches.)

7. Exhibitors must enter level B if the handler or the dog WERE previously entered in this class or have shown in this class in other shows.

8. Dog project must be in the care of the Junior Fair exhibitor and enrolled as a project by June 1 of the current year (except members enrolled in the Pilot Puppy Program which begins at the time of the placement of the puppy).

9. A dog may be entered in Obedience, Grooming and Handling, and Hunting classes.

10. The judge may excuse a dog that attacks another dog or that appears dangerous to other dogs in the ring.

11. Dog Care classes include Member Interview (Questions asked from the Dog Care 200 project book.); Member's Record Form (Exhibitor must complete the record form on pages 65-69 of the Dog Care 200 book for the current year.); Members' Appearance and Attitude; Dog's Appearance and Manners; and Creative Achievement of Member and Dog (Exhibitor must show something that he or she did with or for his or her dog during the current project year. This could include, but is not limited to tricks, costumes, or dog clothing made, scrapbooks, or posters). Youth must bring their dogs to Dog Care judging.

12. Grooming and Handling judging includes an interview, handler appearance and attitude, grooming, handling and group examination.

13. Sub-Novice Obedience classes have all exercises performed on leash. Participants will be expected to demonstrate ability of the animal to heel on lead, Figure 8, stand for examination, recall, long sit (1 minute) and long down (3 minutes).

14. Novice Obedience classes require exhibitor to demonstrate the ability of the animal to heel on lead, Figure 8, stand for examination off leash, heel free, recall off leash, long sit off leash (1 minute) and long down off leash (3 minutes).

15. Graduate Novice class requires the exhibitor to demonstrate the ability of the animal to perform heel on lead, heel off lead, Figure 8 off lead, stand for examination, drop on recall, long sit off leash (3 minutes) handler out of sight, and long down off leash (5 minutes) handler out of sight.

16. Exhibitor may enter one dog in an obedience class, one dog in a grooming and handling class, and one dog in the hunting class.

17. Members who are exhibiting in any obedience class may also enter in Class 2 - Grooming and Handling B.

18. A qualifying ribbon will be awarded to all exhibitors who obtain a qualifying score. A participation ribbon will be awarded to those who do not qualify. Four placings will be presented in each obedience class.

19. To receive a qualifying score in Sub-Novice A or B, a minimum score of 130 points must be obtained of the maximum 230 points. Fifty percent of each section must be completed with sections consisting of:

- Section A: Heel on lead and Figure 8;
- Section B: Stand for examination and recall;
- Section C: Long sit (1 minute) and long down (3 minutes).

20. To receive a qualifying score in Novice or Graduate Novice, a minimum of 130 points must be obtained of the maximum 230 points. Fifty percent of each exercise must be completed.

BOOK 629 - DOG CARE

CLASS 1 - JUNIOR DOG CARE

Exhibitor 9-11 years of age as of January 1 of current year.

CLASS 2 - INTERMEDIATE and SENIOR DOG CARE

Exhibitor 12-18 years of age as of January 1 of current year.

BOOK 630 - GROOMING/OBEDIENCE

CLASS 1 - GROOMING AND HANDLING A

Handler or dog NOT previously entered in this class.

CLASS 2 - GROOMING AND HANDLING B

Handler or dog previously entered in this class or prior show experience in this class.



CLASS 3 - GRADUATE NOVICE

CLASS 4 - NOVICE OBEDIENCE A

Handler or dog NOT previously entered in this class or prior show experience in this class.

CLASS 5 - NOVICE OBEDIENCE B

Handler or dog previously entered in this class or prior show experience in this class.

CLASS 6 - SUB-NOVICE OBEDIENCE A

Handler or dog NOT previously entered in this class.

CLASS 7 - SUB-NOVICE OBEDIENCE B

Handler or dog previously entered in this class or prior show experience.

BOOK 631 - HUNTING DOG

CLASS 1 - HUNTING DOG

Exhibitor 9-18 years of age and enrolled in Dog Care project.

Exhibitor must be able to bench or stack dog for the judge.

Exhibitor must gait dog for the judge.

- Cleanliness of Exhibit 30 points
- Aisle clean and neat, bedding clean and free of manure, attractive atmosphere.
- Eye Appeal 30 points
- Decorations original and artistic, equipment and supplies neatly arranged.
- (Notice: Originality and artistic value are emphasized.)
- Exhibitor's name tag in place, club name displayed 10 points
