Boy Scouts of Coshocton County are part of the Arrowhead District, which is one of the two districts that make up the Muskingum Valley Council. The council covers seven and a half counties in southeastern Ohio. Sir Robert-Baden-Powell founded scouting in 1907, in England. William D. Boyce brought the ideas of scouting to the United States. Boyce and a group of other outstanding men founded the Boy Scouts of America, February 8, 1910, in Washington D.C.

It is the mission of the Muskingum Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America, in cooperation with the community organization, to provide a high quality Scouting program. This will foster in

young people a commitment to serve God and country, using moral character, personal fitness, good citizenship. This will lead to development of mental maturity and leadership ability.

The Scouting program is diverse and flexible, allowing young people to work at their own level of ability and speed. Through the years the Scouting program has been modified and revised to meet the ever changing needs of young people in current day society. The program of the Boy Scouts of America includes:

**Cub Scouts:** Tiger Cubs, Cub Scouts, and Webelos make up the three-part program of the Cub Scouts. Tiger Cubs, designed for boys in the first grade for a boy and his partner. Cub Scouts, a family-centered program, involves parents and family. Webelos, is for the fourth and fifth grade boys, which broadens the range of experiences to include overnight camping.

**Boy Scouts:** Boy Scouts and Varsity Scouts for boys ages 11-17, teaches leadership and decision-making through the patrol method, outdoor experiences and personal achievement.

**Exploring:** This Scouting program is for young men and women in high school, which is structured around six experience areas including service, outdoor, fitness, social, citizenship, and vocational. The program is designed to expose high school students to vast opportunities available to help them make informed career choices.

**Learning for Life:** A subsidiary of the BSA, Learning for Life is the newest Scouting program offered by Muskingum Valley Council. An in-school program, Learning for Life offers a detailed curriculum to be used by teachers to help youth build confidence and self-esteem, create an environment for self-motivation, and reinforce ethical behavior.

**GENERAL GUIDELINES**

1. Every registered unit is eligible to have a booth. Booth space may be reserved by contacting the fair representative no later than the second Friday of September.
2. Each unit that exhibits will provide adult supervision to work a shift in the Scout Building whenever it is open to the public. Neither the Sr. or Jr. Fair Boards or the Boy Scouts will be responsible for loss or damage to exhibits.
3. Each unit will provide a covering or background material for its booth and extend it to the floor.
4. Each unit will provide everything they need to prepare their booth.
5. Scouts' and leaders' names may be included in the exhibits.
6. All exhibits must be completed and in place by 8 p.m. the Thursday before the fair opens.
7. Gate passes will be distributed by the Fair Board Office.
8. Scouts will be required to keep the building clean during the fair.
9. Ribbons and cash premiums will be awarded to each exhibit as follows: Excellent, \$30; Good, \$20; Fair, \$10.
10. Exhibits will not be released until 7 p.m. Thursday, the last day of the fair.

11. Everything must be taken out of the booth. A Junior Fair Board representative will check your booth before you can leave.
12. It will be the responsibility of the Adult Advisory Committee to secure judges.
13. The Coshocton Boy Scouts Fair Committee reserves the option of disallowing payment of all or part of unit premiums if these guidelines, rules and regulations of the Coshocton County Senior and Junior Fair Boards are not strictly adhered to.

**JUDGING FACTORS**

1. Troop or Pack Nos. and sponsor name easily observed. Name tags neatly displayed including rank, merit badge achievement, etc. Boys and Leaders names easily observed.
2. Diversity of merit badges, skill awards, achievements, etc. shown.
3. All projects easily seen not overcrowded.
4. Display should be creative, attractive, balanced.
5. Follows the Junior Fair theme.
6. All exhibits must be completed and in place by 8 p.m. the Thursday before the fair opens.

The Ohio Farm Bureau Federation recognizes the need to acquaint rural young people with the Farm Bureau organization, to develop leadership for the future, and to stimulate the youth's interest in becoming an active part of an agricultural organization. To meet these needs it has developed a program of statewide, regional, and local activities. The grass root unit is

the local Youth Council.

The Farm Bureau Youth Council is a group of rural teenagers who meet once a month to develop and implement a program of education, recreation, and service to the Farm Bureau organizations and the community. The young people choose their own members, elect their own officers, and develop and carry out their own programs. Through informal planning and discussion, the young people find answers to problems and learn to work together cooperatively. Emphasis is on group accomplishment. Group participation is the key to developing individual skills and abilities.

Recreation plays an important role in the Youth Council Program. Learning to have clean, wholesome fun together is a part of growing as individuals. Recreation promotes a wholesome development of the capabilities and functions of a person; it adds zest to living; and above all, it adds color, sweetness and beauty to life.

The Coshocton County Farm Bureau Youth Council serves those 12 years old and up, offering them special outlets and opportunities for their talents in leadership.
